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Ethnicity vs Race

Unlike race, which specifically looks at your physical features, ethnicity zeroes in on your family's cultural and ancestral heritage, like language, traditions, and history, to place you into *categories*. Often, where you are from will partly determine your ethnicity

Examples of Ethnicities:

Japanese American, Caribbean Navajo, Sudanese The names for these divisions, as well as the definition of race, have changed, and continue to do so


